

#### Annual General Meeting Chairmans Report - August 2020

I would like to start off by thanking all my fellow Committee members for their hard work and dedication in this most unusual archery year for our club, a particularly big vote of appreciation goes to Robert who has not only been answering the numerous enquiries we receive throughout the year via email and the contact page on the website, but he has constructed lots of new target stands for us during his time shielding away from the club.

So, no prizes for guessing what the dominant theme of the Chairman's Report is this year. In fact, very few prizes at all this year because of the restrictions that we have had to comply with regarding the Coronavirus.

Perhaps we should all reflect on how lucky we are to live in our area, and have such wonderful facilities at our disposal, allowing the club (after 2 months hiatus), to very carefully and cautiously move out of lockdown and resume our archery in a safe manner. The only club in Herefordshire to be able to do so.

Of course, we are yet (at the time of writing) to fully go back to how things were prior to the rise of Coronavirus, and we are currently unsure what the new normal will become at the club, at competitions (both internal and external) and indeed, in society in general. Sadly, not all of our members have rejoined us on the line under our new procedures, but we look forward to welcoming some absentees back in the next few weeks.

Restrictions placed upon us have not only meant suspension of shooting for our members for two months, but also, we have been unable to host any Have-a-Go events, Taster events or Beginners Courses. During any normal year we would also have participated in a number of external events around the county, however of course these have also been cancelled. The effect of all this has been a direct loss of income for the club, additionally, we have not had the influx of new members that we would normally have expected, another income stream lost.

Another impact that we have seen is that our 3 coaching candidates have had their course suspended and as a consequence have not yet been able to achieve their Level 1 coaching qualifications. It is hoped that these courses will resume as soon as possible.

Currently we are unable to shoot in the barn. Of course, this is not a true 'indoor' area as it is open to the elements on one side, but it is enclosed on the 3 other sides - so perhaps it follows that this is  $^3/_4$  indoors? As such we would be required to implement much more stringent restrictions limiting the numbers of people being able to shoot - and before we could open the barn we would have to come up with a way of safely shooting within socially distancing guidelines that would be fair to all members - not just one or two. Currently, as we have 'spread out' on the line we are not strictly observing the safety zone on the left (track) side of the field and the barn cannot be used at the same time as shooting is taking place on the main field target range.

Our indoor shooting attendance at Tarrington was rather disappointing for the 2019 / 2020 season. As we had quite large numbers for previous indoor seasons leading to congestion on the line, and in the kitchen area, we decided to split the sessions in two, allowing for a much more comfortable and pleasant shooting environment. Despite this, we maintained very low charges to our members and as a result unfortunately our costs were not covered and we made a loss of £180.00. At the current time we are unsure of the availability of Lady Emily Hall and the viability of indoor shooting at all.

We have had many enquiries over the last few months, both from experienced archers and from people who feel they would like to take up the sport. It is up to ourselves to decide how we can offer places to these people - whether we will have the space going forward to expand the club to greater numbers than we currently have whilst still being able to comply with social distancing requirements whilst shooting, or if we should decide to leave the current numbers as they are until such times as social distancing becomes a thing of the past - which will probably not be until a viable vaccine for Covid 19 is found and provided to the population as a whole.

I very much hope that the Chairman's message for 2021 will contain much more positive news, but unfortunately to a large extent this will be out of our hands.

# Annual General Meeting Treasurer's Report - August 2020

Please see the attached accounts for our year ending 31st July 2020. I took over as treasurer at the beginning of last October and have adopted a somewhat different (and computerised) format for the accounts than that previously used. This has the advantage of enabling of a more detailed analysis of income and expenditure but precludes a direct comparison on this occasion between this year and its predecessor.

Turning to the figures, it will be seen that we have just kept our head above water by making a surplus of £26.87. Times have been exceptional and this is reflected in a material reduction in income from "have a go" stands and the like at events and country fairs. Also, we have invested £500 in coaching courses which will provide dividends in due course as and when we can return to normality. The winter shooting at Tarrington proved to be somewhat of a disappointment financially as our new format failed to find favour with enough archers to prevent a loss of £180.

I can say that our membership subscriptions were up by some £288, but Archery GB and (to a far lesser extent) Hereford and West Midlands Associations take a goodly proportion of those subscriptions, so we do need to augment our income where we can from beginners' courses, displays and the like next year if we are able to do so. We go into our new financial year with reserves in cash and at bank of £3194.81.

Let us hope for better times to come!
